School Reporting Changes

With the ongoing implementation of the updated NZ curriculum currently underway, we are having to make changes to our mid and end of year reporting template. The mid year reports have the new learning phases which are: *Phase 1 Year 0-3, Phase 2 Year 4-6 and Phase 3 Year 7 and 8.*

The teachers will use an overall teacher judgment (OTJ) which is a culmination of all your child's assessment and school work set against the curriculum objectives in each of the phases at their year level. There are four overall teacher judgment levels. Needing Support, Working Towards the Phase, Working Within the Phase and Working Above the Phase. Along with the OTJ, the teachers will have the usual commentary and next steps to ensure progress continues. An information sheet will be emailed home with the reports to help parents understand these changes.

Wānanga Bus Trip By Cooper Chalmers

On Friday, May 30th, I was one of the 30 tamariki who went on the Wānanga bus trip. We toured Porirua and learned about the history of haukāinga (home).

We learned about how Maui discovered Aotearoa, by fishing up the North Island with a hook made out of his Grandmother's jaw bone. We also learned that our harbour Te Awarua o Porirua got polluted from the Kenupuru Hospital and the sewerage plant when they flushed down poisons and chemicals. Now they have a great plan to clean the harbour using shellfish, as these can filter the poisons out of the harbour. Unfortunately, they must first fix all the sewer pipes before we get started. Won't it be great when we can collect kaimoana and swim in our harbour again!

The first bus stop was at the Takapūwāhia Marae in Titahi Bay and we learned that all the decisions were made in the kīhini (kitchen) and that they had a medical centre there too for all the tamariki from the marae.

One of my favourite parts of the bus trip was at Motukaraka Point. Rangihaeata and his tāngata (people) that lived there, built a 5 metre high fence that could block the cannons of the HMS Driver.

The HMS Driver was a wooden paddle boat that was ordered on the 12th of March 1840 and sailed around Aotearoa and other European countries and had a 7-year war with some of our Maori tangata.

After all the storytelling on the bus, we went to the workshop and did Ti Rakau and made a Koauau, Koauau is a traditional Maori instrument made from clay that makes a deep noise when you blow in the holes carved into the ball-shaped instrument.

Rangatahi Rōpu - By Lewis

On Wednesday, the 28th of May, 10 of us from Paremata as well as rangatahi from ten other kura, went to Maraeroa



Marae in Porirua. When we got there, we were welcomed in with a mihi whakatau. This is less formal than a Pōwhiri. We were then split into 4 groups and each group went to a different place to do activities. I started with a small lesson on the history and journey of Te reo Māori in NZ. I learned that before the Europeans came, all the merchants who were in the Pacific who visited NZ spoke Māori because no one spoke English. But when the European settlers started to come in the 1800s, more people started to speak English. In 1840, when the treaty was signed, the Māori language was listed as a taonga (treasure) that was to be protected.

But then, 27 years later in 1867, the Native Schools Act was officially implemented. This act banned the use of Te reo Māori in schools, not following the protection of Te reo Māori.

After we finished learning about the journey of Te reo Māori we moved on to the next activity. At the next activity we played games. For one of the games we played, we were split into teams and each team stood in a line holding hands, the person at the end squeezed the person next to them's hand, who did the same, and then the next person did the same and so on. When the squeeze got to the end of the line, the person at the end sent it back and when the first person in the line felt the squeeze, they ran to grab a poi on the other side of the room. The team that grabbed to poi first won.



The next activity we did was with the rākau. We play a game called Maui Matou. In the game, we stood in a circle and there was someone in the middle. When the person in the middle called Maui you let go of your rākau and grabbed the one to the left of you. When the person in the middle called Matou you did the same thing but moved to the right. Then last we learned a new haka which was hard but fun at the same time.

Rangitahi Rōpu - By Willow



On Wednesday, the 28th of May, me and nine other people from the Kahikatea syndicate made our way to Maraeroa Marae. It was an experience I will never forget.

When we first got there, we were welcomed in with a mihi whakatau and sat down inside

the marae. After learning about Te Haerenga o Te Reo Maori/ The Journey of Te Reo Māori, we began getting into four groups. Each group was put into a different activity. My group started with learning a new haka. It was quite hard but fun at the same time.

After we had learned the haka, we went into the marae and did a quiz. The quiz was quite hard and VERY confusing. After the quiz, we went on and did skits in our groups. We received a single Māori word from our tuakana and that's what we had to do in our skit. It was really fun.

After we watched everyone's skits we walked into the Wharekai to play some games. The games we played were great, but my favourite one was a game that's kind of like Chinese whispers, except instead of a sentence, you have a set of dance moves. After we played some games, Matua John came in and told us about his history and the history of the marae. That was probably one of my favourite parts because it was so interesting to hear about what he had gone through and the history of the marae. He told us about why Maraeroa Marae was the only Marae that faced away from the rising sun. This was because the marae was facing the direction of where their people had travelled to. He also explained who the people on the walls are and who the statues resemble. My favourite thing he talked to us about was when he walked around and told us about everything in the marae, starting from the front and making his way all around the marae, explaining everything and what it means.

The last activity we did in our groups was play Maui /Matau with rakau and then finally we did the new haka all together.

The Kahui Ako Rangitahi Ropu trip was such an amazing experience, and I would love to continue doing it for the rest of my years to come.
