Ruma Kakapo (13) has had a trip to some of the historical places of Porirua. Let's tell you what happened. First we got on the bus and everyone was very excited. Woosh! The engine started up and the mix of laughter made the bus very noisy.

Mrs Leggett started telling us about our destination and she said look there is the statue of Te Rauparaha and his waka then told us how he used to write poetry when his land was taken. We saw old houses that the Austrians built. Finally, we got to Te Korohiwa whaling station then we saw Mana island and Komanga-Rautawhiri where Kupe first landed. We stood where the whalers had watched for the whales and if they saw one they would shout 'thar she blows'.

Te korohiwa was a small shore whaling whaling station used between 1837-1845 at Titahi Bay. With two whaling boats and fifteen whalers. Whales were cut up and the blubber boiled in tri-pots for oil on the northern side of the bluff and the whalers lived in a hut on the southern side of the bluff away from the smell of leftover whale meat. Lots of Pakeha whalers married Ngati Toa woman too.

It started raining and our faces became wet with sea spray. We went up a steep and rocky path up to the bus which was coated in a thick layer of rain. Everyone ran back onto the bus to get out of the rain.

We hopped out and the rain had stopped so we had morning tea at Ngati Toa Domain boatshed. We crossed a muddy field to the old barracks. They were crumbling and small stones were falling off. The barracks were built out of stones and the mortar was made from crushed shells from the beach which was what the soldiers used as concrete and this was why the barracks fell down in the 1848 earthquake. When the soldiers were fighting against Ngati Toa it was used as a house for protection and the ammunition was stored behind the fireplace because that was the only place that could keep it dry but if a spark from the fireplace set off in the wrong direction then the whole place could have blown up in seconds! We crossed the field imagining what it would be like to be here firing guns in the wind and rain with mouldy tents and wet uniforms and blankets in the middle of winter.

We started walk to where Joseph Tom's whaling station was. Mrs Leggett told us about Joseph Toms and he was a very mean guy and no one wanted to mess around with him. Joseph Toms established his whaling station at Paremata point next to the Ngati te ra. He married Nohorua's daughter. Nohorua was a Ngati Toa chief. Then we went on to the bus again and off to Plimmerton where we went to the fire station where Te Rangihaeata's pa was and where Te Rauparaha sometimes visited him.

We got off the bus once more and walked up a steep hill and the stones from the gravel fell down behind us. We saw St Albans church in Pauatahanui which used to be a pa built by Te Rangihaeata in May 1846. The pa was built on a ridge running into the eastern arm of Pauatahanui inlet. The stream protected the pa on three sides, palisades surrounded the whole pa and covered gun pits were added making it a true gunfire pa. Matai-taua had two rows of palisades and the inner timber was about five metres high.

A second defence was a ditch two metres deep. Behind this there was a bank of earth with gaps to allow the defenders to fire their muskets through the gaps. Matai-taua was the most heavily defended pa in Porirua. It was also the last fighting pa to be built. On the 1 August 1846 a force of friendlies (maori that are friendly to British) were sent to fight Te Rangihaeata. He fled to the Horokiri Valley (now called Paekakariki Hill Road) They fought the battle of Horokiri which lasted over 10 days on a hill now called Battle Hill. No one won that battle.

Finally, we hopped on the bus and went back to school. That was the best, we all said. By Asta and Makayla
